NEW YORK (CNNMoney.com) -- About one in six U.S. drivers wouldn't be able to pass a written driving test if they took it today, according to a new study.

The 2008 GMAC Insurance National Drivers Test found that 16.4%, of drivers, or 33 million, don't know the rules of the road.

The survey presented 5,524 drivers from all 50 states with 20 questions derived from official Department of Motor Vehicle tests. Among the main sticking points were what to do when approaching a yellow light, and the safe distance to maintain behind another car.

Overall, the national average score grew slightly to 78.1% from 77.1% in 2007, but scores varied based on driver demographic and geography.

The study found that drivers over the age of 35 were more likely to pass, and women were more likely to fail than men.

Drivers in the Northeast continued to have the lowest scores and the highest failure rates, with New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, and the District of Columbia maintaining their three-year streak in the bottom five rankings. Drivers from the Midwest had the highest scores and the lowest failure rate, with Kansas taking the top spot this year from Idaho.

DARWIN, Australia (AP) -- An Australian driver who secured a carton of beer in his car with a seat belt but left a 5-year-old child unrestrained was fined 750 Australian dollars (\$710; €460), police said Tuesday.

Constable Wayne Burnett said he was "shocked and appalled" when he pulled over the unregistered car on Friday in the central Australian town of Alice Springs.

The 30-can carton was strapped in between the two adults sitting in the back seat of the car. The child was also in back, on the vehicle's floor.

"The child was sitting in the lump in the center, unrestrained," Burnett told reporters Tuesday.

"I haven't ever seen something like this before," he said. "This is the first time that the beer has taken priority over a child."

The driver was fined for driving an unregistered and uninsured vehicle, and for failing to ensure a child was wearing a seat belt.

Alice Springs Police Superintendent Sean Parnell expressed shock at the incident in a statement released Tuesday. "This serves as a timely reminder to all drivers to ensure they wear seat belts and ensure as is their responsibility that all passengers in their vehicle are secured in the appropriate manner," he said

PERTH AMBOY — A 96-year-old man who had resisted efforts by police to jail him for traffic infractions is being held in the Middlesex County jail after being arrested on a bench warrant.

Perth Amboy police arrested Charlie Uzar on Tuesday. A Municipal Court judge had issued the warrant in response to Uzar's refusal to surrender Jan. 12.

"I don't think he deserves to be locked up," said his lawyer. "He's 96 years old, only 5 feet tall. If he weighs 100 pounds, it's a lot."

In November, Uzar was found guilty on three counts of driving with a suspended license, two counts of leaving the scene of an accident and one count each of failure to report an accident, driving with an uninsured vehicle and driving carelessly.

He was sentenced to 93 days in jail, but he could serve as few as 63 days for good behavior. Police impounded his car, thus removing any danger he might pose to the public, Book said.

Following his arrest, Uzar complained about trouble breathing, and police took him to Raritan Bay Medical Center, where he was treated and released. He was then taken to the jail, where he remained Friday afternoon.

A Perth Amboy bail bondsman, posted a \$10,000 bail for Uzar after reading about his arrest in a newspaper. But a judge voided the bail Thursday and ordered him to remain in jail.

"He's 96 years old," the Bondsman told Gannett New Jersey. "We have worse things out there we have to worry about than Charlie."

Listening and talking to children about their concerns can reassure them that they will be safe. Start by encouraging them to discuss how they have been affected by what is happening around them. Even young children may have specific questions about tragedies. Children react to stress at their own developmental level.

The Caring for Every Child's Mental Health Campaign offers these pointers for parents and other caregivers:

- * Encourage children to ask questions. Listen to what they say. Provide comfort and assurance that address their specific fears. It's okay to admit you can't answer all of their questions.
- * Talk on their level. Communicate with your children in a way they can understand. Don't get too technical or complicated.
- * Find out what frightens them. Encourage your children to talk about fears they may have. They may worry that someone will harm them at school or that someone will try to hurt you.
- * Focus on the positive. Reinforce the fact that most people are kind and caring. Remind your child of the heroic actions taken by ordinary people to help victims of tragedy.
- * Pay attention. Your children's play and drawings may give you a glimpse into their questions or concerns. Ask them to tell you what is going on in the game or the picture. It's an opportunity to clarify any misconceptions, answer questions, and give reassurance.
- * Develop a plan. Establish a family emergency plan for the future, such as a meeting place where everyone should gather if something unexpected happens in your family or neighborhood. It can help you and your children feel safer.

If you are concerned about your child's reaction to stress or trauma, call your physician or a community mental health center.
